CLASS NEWS - TERM 1

Deanwood Nursery

This term, Deanwood nursery have prioritised supporting the children to settle back in and meeting new adults and peers. It has been a wonderful start to a brand-new year.

We have also delved in to our topic 'All About Me' and have used this as an opportunity to encourage conversations about the children and their families and pets, things they like and dislike and what our homes look like. We have also used opportunities in our play to observe our names, faces, hands and shoe size to learn a little bit more about ourselves.

Tapestry is now back up and running so please keep an eye out for observations of your children's learning, and thank you for your patience while we set this up.

A reminder as the weather turns colder that our provision engages children in outdoor play all year round. Your child will need a change of named clothes and underwear available, as well as welly boots and appropriate outerwear. Next term we will be taking a look at fairytales, so please see if you can support your child by looking at a few classics like *Goldilocks and the*



Pine Class

This term Pine class have been settling in to Reception and building relationships with their familiar adults and new peers. We have achieved a great deal over such a short space of time and it has been wonderful getting to meet all of the grown ups too. The class are successfully joining in with some daily carpet sessions and we are just starting our journey into phonics too, so thank you to everyone who managed to come to the workshop! All children have completed the Reception Baseline Assessment, which helps give the adults a better idea of everyone's starting points so we can effectively plan how to support your child to grow and learn during their time with us.

We have also been very busy exploring *The Gruffalo* by Julia Donaldson, and have even made some Gruffalo crumble. Yum!
Children in Pine class have been developing their gross motor skills by using the climbing apparatus, exploring the outdoor area and moving around safely on the bikes. Fine motor skills are being built upon for children that are ready and some of us are managing to form the letters in their names. I look forward to seeing how our learning grows next term, too!



Maple Class

This term, Maple Class have been learning about themselves. We have looked at photos of us from when we were babies and compared them to how we have changed over time - especially the transition from Yr R to Yr 1.

In Science, we have been learning about parts of the body and our 5 senses. We investigated how we use these senses to understand the world around us. We have used our eyes to complete

observational drawings, our mouths to taste lots of yummy healthy food, and we used our hands to find out what was in the box! We used our noses to match the scents and our ears to identify different sounds.



In Art we looked at exploring lines and experimenting with different media. We used a variety of lines to create line art in the style of Bridget Riley and we used shapes to create abstract art in the style of Kandinsky.

In English we have been writing all about ourselves. We looked at pictures of ourselves to describe what we look like. We wrote about the people we live with. We have written about our favourite things. We used this to write a letter to a pen pal, telling them all about us. We have been busy using capital letters, finger spaces, full stops and adjectives.

We have been very busy in Year 1 this term learning all about ourselves and we are looking forward to finding out what our new topic will be next term.

Oak Class

This term Oak class have been learning all about dinosaurs, fossils and Mary Anning as part of their 'Dinosaurs' topic. We have looked at different dinosaurs from prehistoric periods, explored whether they were carnivores, herbivores or omnivores and even made our own dinosaur skeletons from pasta shells. During our English lessons, we have studied a text called 'The Adventures of Eggbox Dragon' and have designed, labelled and created our own Eggbox Dragons, role played scenes from the book and written letters to Eggbox Dragon to ask for his help with our own lost items. Throughout our maths lessons, we have learnt all about place value: identifying tens and ones, finding different ways to represent numbers to 100, comparing objects and ordering numbers, too. We will be moving on to our 2, 5 and 10times tables when beginning our 'Addition and Subtraction' unit, so please continue to support your child with Times Tables Rockstars so their automaticity of multiplications is successful. Throughout our curriculum subjects, Oak class have continued to develop their artistic skills by producing natural sculptures in the style of Andy Goldsworthy and have been on hunts around the school for natural objects, as well as exploring micro-habitats for our science lessons.

As we plan ahead for our journey through Year 2, I ask that you continue to support your child with their phonics and reading by encouraging your child to read daily and to practice their spellings each week for Friday's spelling test. Thank you for all your amazing support and kindness this term, it has been a wonderful start to the year.



Cedar Class

Wow! What an excellent start to the Year we have had in Cedar Class. The children have settled really well into Year 3 now and are getting to grips with being in Key Stage 2.

We have been learning all about numbers in our Maths work and have been trying hard to make sure we are confident counters! We have been making sure that we can count on in 10s and 1s from any number to 100 and now even up to 1000. We have also been working on recognising 100s and counting using 100s. The children have enjoyed using base 10 to support them in their learning.

In our Literacy, we read the story of UG – Genius of the Stone Age. In UG's world, everything was made of stone - of course we knew that everything wasn't made of stone in the Stone Age. UG was always inventing things but sadly his family thought he was mad! We tried to help UG by coming up with some of our own inventions to make life in the Stone Age easier.



Speaking of the Stone Age, we have been learning all about it in our Topic lessons. We have learnt about different types of housing, tools and weapons. We have also learnt about features such as Stonehenge. Lots of the children in Year 3 have made amazing models as part of their homework to support their learning.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank all the parents in supporting their children at home with their reading, spellings and maths. We can't wait for next term!

Willow Class

Year 4 have made a fantastic start to this academic year and have settled in very well.

In Science we have been learning about sound.

We have explored how sound travels, by measuring the distance in steps, when listening to what our peers had said. The children also created some beautiful



homemade shoe-box guitars and in class they experimented with yoghurt pots and elastic



bands, by watching the vibrations and listening to the pitch. The class has had fun




finding out that it is not the ear

that actually hears the sound. Ask them to explain how hearing works.

In Literacy we have been reading the story 'Mouse Bird Snake Wolf'- A mysterious world, where there are gaps and holes of missing creations. We explored this world from Little

Ben's perspective, using our skills with senses, alliteration and onomatopoeia to write about it.



In Maths we have learned about place value to support counting on and reasoning, when problem solving numbers to 10,000.

Thank you to all parents and carers for supporting your children with their beautiful homework based around our topic Route 66. Please do continue to read and practise the timestables on a daily basis, as this will improve, both, your child's Writing and Maths skills throughout.

Hawthorn Class

This term our topic was Victorians. We had an amazing Victorians Day where the children dressed up and spent the day experiencing the delights and horrors of a typical Victorian school day. Mrs Smith and Mrs Downs were both impressed by the fantastic costumes. In the morning, the children had the opportunity to taste gruel and listened to some Bible stories. The boys did a construction lesson whilst the girls made peg dolls. Behaviour was an important part of the day and a few of the children ended up wearing the dunce hat!! In the afternoon, the children got to make the traditional Victorian toy the thaumatrope. Our writing this term has also been based around the Victorians. The text was called Street Child. The children have seemed to have really

In Science we have been learning about forces. We have been learning about gravity and air resistance. We made parachutes and then tested them to see which material would be the best for air resistance. To our surprise, it was the kitchen towel that won, so remember to always have some handy!

For PE, the children have been learning how to play basketball. Many games have been enjoying and it has been nice to see their competitive side shine!

The children have worked really hard this term and it has been lovely getting to know them all. Have a wonderful half term and we can't wait to see you all after the holidays.

Elm Class

Our book for this term has been the London Eye Mystery. We started by writing a piece of descriptive writing, describing a journey up to the top of the London Eye and the back down again, focusing on all of the sights and sounds we could see and hear in London. The writing was fantastic! Next we used our Power of Reading scheme to write a Police report about the missing boy in the book, Salim. The children tried hard to write in a formal style, like Police officers do. The children have been really enjoying hearing about Ted's investigation into the disappearance of his cousin, Salim, and they can't wait to continue to the book next term.

In PE, the children have been learning handball. We began by learning about the different types of passing, before moving onto dribbling. Finally, we looked how to score and defend. The children have shown excellent handball and PE skills, showing good sportsmanship skills and more importantly, had fun.

In geography, our topic has been called 'Our United Kingdom'. We started by locating the UK on various maps, and then we looked more closely at the UK. The children were able to label the countries which make up the UK and their capital cities. We then looked at the physical geography of the UK; this including naming and labelling the seas and oceans which surround us, the highest mountains and the longest rivers. The children then looked more closely at the features of rivers, in particular the River Thames. We are looking forward to continuing this topic next term.

For our Harvest celebration, we created soup cans in the pop art style of Andy Warhol.
